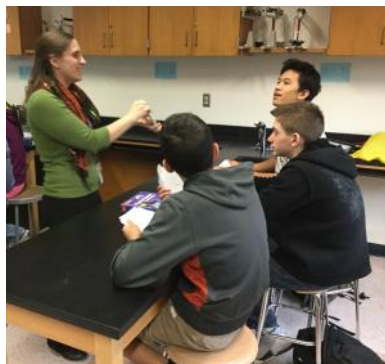

Science Department News

Next Generation Science Standards

NHS Science teachers Fawn Georgina and Emily Neff will attend an April workshop on the new *Next Generation Science Standards* (NGSS) that were adopted by Connecticut on November 4, 2015. Specifically, it will focus on using the EQulP rubric to evaluate activities, assignments, and assessments for alignment with NGSS. This will aid Newtown's science teachers, at the high school and across the district, in their efforts to implement the new standards when they go into effect, starting with grades K-3, 6 and 9 in the 2017-2018 school year.



Integrated Physical & Earth Science

Freshmen science students in IPES (Integrated Physical & Earth Science) demonstrated different types of chemical reactions: synthesis, decomposition, replacement, acid base neutralization reactions.

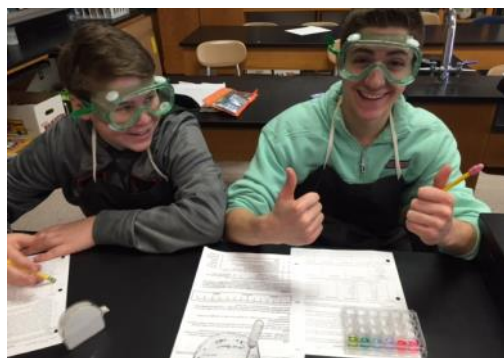


Science is fun!!



Acids & Bases

Freshmen scientists study acids and bases by testing the pH of substances using a cabbage indicator they made and pH paper. After testing standard solutions, they made predictions for common household solutions and mixtures of different solutions.

Mrs. Allegretto's AP Biology students used model kits to explore DNA structure and semi-conservative replication (that is, one strand is copied from and paired with an original (conserved) strand).

Gap Year Programs

“A gap year is a period of time when students take a break from formal education to travel, volunteer, study, intern, or work. A gap year is also referred to as a deferred year, year out, year off, time off. A gap year experience can last for several weeks, a semester, or up to a year or more.

Career Center Information

Education Connection's Regional Medical Internship Program



Selected junior and senior students participate in a one- or two-year program designed to explore health careers. Students may complete two nine-week paid internships per year.

In addition students are required to attend a monthly class and utilize Moodle both to complete assignments and as their web-based communication tool. This is the only opportunity for students to complete paid internships at one of the local hospitals.

A parent/student orientation will be scheduled in late May for students having completed an application. Applications are available in the Career Center and students are encouraged to apply before May 15.



Campus Tour for Sophomores & Juniors

Ms. Violette and Mr. DeFeo have arranged an information session and campus tour of Southern Connecticut State University on April 21, 2016. The bus will leave NHS at 8:30am and return by 2:00pm.

Students are asked to buy their own lunch on campus or bring a lunch. The cost of the bus is covered by a grant so there is no charge for the trip. The field trip is open to the first 15 students that complete and return a signed field trip form. Forms are available in the Career Center.

High School Partnership Program

Naugatuck Valley Community College is now offering to cover the cost of tuition and fees for a single class for three students who will be junior or senior students in the fall 2016. Here are the details:

- Students will be responsible for books, supplies and transportation.
- Right now all courses, but science, are eligible, but NVCC has the right to approve the course.
- Students must take the Accuplacer and test into college level Math and English to participate. (For new students, NVCC waives the Accuplacer if they score a 500 or above on their SAT Math and English.)
- Students will come to campus to register for their selected course on one of two days reserved for High School Partnership students. Registration is on a space available basis and takes place on the two days before the semester begins. Students will be notified of registration dates by email.
- College credits earned may be transferred.

Copies of the student application and counselor recommendation form are available in the Career Center and Mrs. Ragaini is happy to assist you in getting your counselor form completed and with the course selection. This program is open to the first three students submitting a completed application and the student section of the Counselor Recommendation form. Applications will be accepted for two alternates. If the program is available in the spring 2017 semester, the alternates will have the first opportunity to participate. For more information email ragainip@newtown.k12.ct.us or call 203.426.7679.

Scholarships



Our scholarship list is updated weekly. In the coming weeks and months many of the local scholarships will arrive in the Career Center. Some paper applications for the scholarships are available in the Career Center but most are available online. Please check [Naviance](#) for the available scholarships. When applying for scholarships, be mindful of deadlines. Do not wait until the last minute to gather the documentation you need to complete a scholarship application, i.e. recommendations, transcripts, SAT/ACT scores.

Many of the scholarships are for seniors only. There are a few in the list that are available for underclassmen. A legend (included here) is available to help differentiate which scholarships are for which grades and which scholarships are new for the week. If you have any questions regarding scholarships, contact Mrs. Latowicki.

Scholarship Tips for Seniors

- Scholarships are for those seniors who are planning on continuing their education at either a 4-year or 2-year college, or technical school.
- Each scholarship is different and reading for details is important. Be mindful of deadlines. There are rarely extensions or excuses accepted if an application is late. You do not have to wait until the due date to submit or mail a scholarship application. Waiting until the due date may be problematic if you are sick, or there is a storm, etc.
- Transcript and report card requests must be made at least 24 hours in advance through Mrs. Latowicki or a School Counseling secretary. Again, do not wait until the last minute to request these documents.
- There are scholarships based on interests, religion, ethnicity, a disability, community service, GPA's, majors, etc.
- Check for scholarships through your parents' and/or grandparents' employers or organizations they are involved with.
- Check the website of the school you plan on attending since many schools offer scholarships which go unanswered since many students are unaware that scholarships are being offered.
- Scholarships may reduce your financial aid. If this causes a problem, a call to the financial aid office at the school you are attending to explain your situation may be helpful.
- Never fill out an application in pencil.
- Most applications may be downloaded from [Naviance](#) unless otherwise noted. Paper applications are available in the Career Center as specified. Some applications are through specific websites, also noted in [Naviance](#).
- Check other scholarship websites listed on your [Naviance](#) home page, i.e. Cappex, Sallie Mae, College Week Live, Fast Web, etc.
- **PLEASE remember to write thank you note/s to the individual/organization who offered the scholarship. This is a very important step in the scholarship process.**
