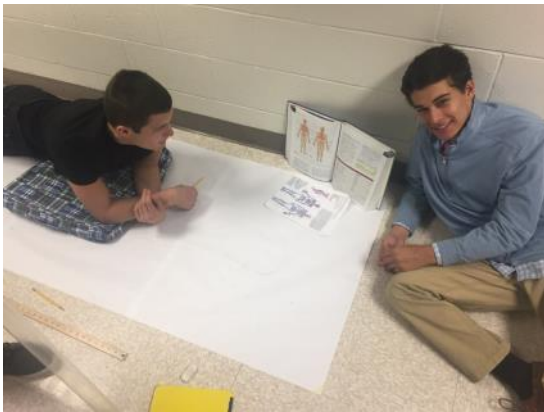
Science Department News

Mrs. Baumgartner's freshmen science students began their renewable energy unit by designing and building wind turbines.

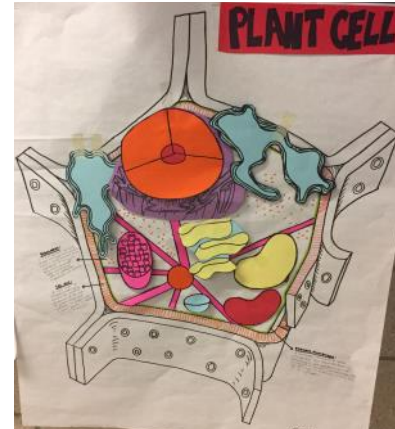
One of the classes was treated to a presentation by Bill Stevens, an executive with NJR Energy and the father of a student in the class. Mr. Stevens discussed how wind turbines are built, where wind turbines are most useful, and some of the pros and cons of using wind for energy. It was very informative and the students used their new knowledge to design and build wind turbines during their next lab class.

Once students had completed their turbines, they held them in front of a moving fan and connected them to a meter to see how much electricity they produced when the fan's breeze turned their turbines. There were many creative designs and they all produced electricity!



Plant & Animals Cell Structures in 3D

Mrs. Merritt's Biology students demonstrated their knowledge of the structure of plant and animals cells by making 3D posters of each type of cell. They are on display in the F-Wing, across from room F210, so come check them out!

Gap Year Programs



“A gap year is a period of time when students take a break from formal education to travel, volunteer, study, intern, or work. A gap year is also referred to as a deferred year, year out, year off, time off. A gap year experience can last for several weeks, a semester, or up to a year or more. Typically a gap year is taken between high school graduation and starting college, during college, or between college and starting graduate school or a career.”

Education Connection's Regional Medical Internship Program

Selected junior and senior students participate in a one- or two-year program designed to explore health careers. Students may complete two nine-week paid internships per year. In addition students are required to attend a monthly class and utilize Moodle to complete assignments and as their web-based communication tool. This is the only opportunity for students to complete paid internships at one of the local hospitals. A parent/student orientation will be scheduled in late May for students having completed an application. Applications are available in the Career Center and students are encouraged to apply before May 15.

1. Transportation Attendant

STEM Type: Investigator

Check out this job if you enjoy helping others and traveling. STEM investigators are curious, excel at communication, and enjoy working with others. Working in the transportation world as an attendant would be a great way to apply STEM to a **job that most people don't realize involves it**. And if college isn't the right fit for you, this transportation job could be an exciting way to start working right after high school.

Median Salary: \$30,540

Training Required: High school diploma

Companies Hiring: AMTRAK

2. Civil Engineer

STEM Type: Designer

Check out this job if you're good with details and you want to help cities and transportation run more efficiently. STEM designers are able to take plans and ideas and transform them into tangible products. Civil engineers oversee construction projects by analyzing proposals, testing materials, performing soil tests, and setting up budgets, among many other things. Becoming a civil engineer can be difficult but you get to see the immediate impact of your work, making it a rewarding transportation job.

Median Salary: \$82,220

Training Required: A bachelor's degree in civil engineering or civil engineering technology is usually required. Boise State University, Carnegie Mellon University, and Clemson University all have programs that can train you.

Companies Hiring: Air Force

3. Transportation Analyst

STEM Type: Integrator

Check out this job if you are a problem solver. STEM integrators work with others to achieve their dreams, making communication and relationship building key skills. Transportation analysts identify problems and find solutions to help their company streamline supply and transportation. If you can always think of ways to do things better, this could be one of the best transportation jobs for you.

Median Salary: \$50,900

Training Required: Most companies look for a bachelor's degree in business, management, engineering, transportation, or other technical field. Arizona State University, Florida Institute of Technology, and Morgan State University can all get you started down the right path for this and other transportation jobs.

Companies Hiring: Amazon, BAE Systems, Schneider National

4. Survey Technician

STEM Type: Explorer

Check out this job if you have a mind for data and enjoy being outside. STEM explorers are experts in their field and use research to dig deeper and communicate their knowledge to others. Survey technicians examine geographical data and apply their research to help surveyors and cartographers. If you want to be involved in transportation in a very practical way, this transportation job could be a great fit.

Median Salary: \$42,010

Training Required: High school diploma

5. Environmental Engineer

STEM Type: Advisor

Check out this job if you care about the environment and have a mind for numbers. STEM advisors thrive when helping others and apply compassion to their job. Environmental engineers apply compassion and care to the environment through engineering. Environmental engineering offers a wide range of job opportunities, from waste management to pollution control, making this one of the most diverse transportation jobs.

Median Salary: \$84,560

Training Required: Employers are looking for a bachelor's degree in environmental engineering, but will also consider applicants with degrees in civil, chemical, or general engineering. Jackson State University, Missouri University of Science and Technology, and National University all have degree programs to get you into this exciting career.
